

FIRST VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR RICHARD'S NEWS


After the go-cart track we went to Australia Zoo. I hadn't been for a dozen years, and it has changed significantly.

For those of you who have been in this role previously I hope you are finding it a breeze and for those new to the role I hope that you are settling in and take time to pat yourself on the back and reflect on how much you are learning and achieving.

This month you will receive an email from me with an estimate of the number of delegates and alternates your Clubs are entitled to for the Q3 Convention 29 September to 1 October. Table this at your next Board Meeting and let your Club members choose their representatives. Remember as a delegate you are still required to register to attend Convention.

I will also be asking you to complete a memorial return for the Millmerran Convention for any of our members and their families who have gone to higher service since our Convention in Caloundra in September 2022.

I encourage as many of you as possible to attend Convention. It is a great opportunity to network, find out more about our District and activities. Attend your District's Annual General Meeting. Meet up with old friends and make new ones. The Friday night opening and Flag ceremony is a lovely start to the weekend. The Memorial Service is always moving as we honour those of our Lions families that have left us in the last twelve months. The static displays are so interesting and enable us to learn more about our Lions Projects and Foundations. A favourite of mine is the Youth Forums normally on Sunday morning. Think about entering the Cake Icing Competition. These cakes will be actioned at the Saturday night District Governors Banquet.

The DG team are preparing their schedules for

their Club visits, please try to accommodate their date requests and if it is not possible suggest some alternative dates. Think about Club members that would be worthy recipients of the DG Excellence Award and Distinguished Service Award that can be presented to Club members during their visits.

For some months now I have been telling you of the changes that will be coming to MyLCI/MyLion. This will happen shortly (possibly mid-September) and every Lion will need to re-register to access the new Portal.

The introduction of Salesforce requires that each Lion has an individual email address unique to them to access the new system (LCI rules not mine). This means that any couples who normally operate from the one email address MUST address this problem. Equally, many Lions do not have their own email address but rely on a Club email address for information. This is not acceptable under the new system and needs to be addressed for the reasons indicated.

If your data is not correct by the time Salesforce comes in, your Club runs the risk of serious anomalies at that time. Thank you to those Clubs, and I know there are many, that have checked and updated their members data.



The event was very successful and a great fundraiser for our Club.



CAKES -

Just a reminder with Cakes this month, to get onto the website to get the 2023 Order Form (remember that you **must** use the current form no other form will be accepted this year) you will need the logon info.

UserID - cakes

Why not consider your order for this year and try and get it in earlier than usual, you will then guarantee to get the stock you want. Having said that we should not have too many stock problems this year as we now have our own holding warehouse at Acacia Ridge where our deliveries will come from.

MINTS -

I do need to catch you up on the latest Mint information that has come in, so this month it will mainly be about Mints.

STOCK UPDATE

As you are aware we have been behind with our deliveries. However, we have almost caught up with our backlog and now we are sending our orders from May/June.

NEW PRICING

This new pricing will be effective from 15/05/23. Any orders received from this date will be at the new pricing and any orders we are still fulfilling from the backlog will be at the current prices.

NEW ORDER FORM

The current order form has been updated due to new pricing. This will be effective from 15/05/23. Please ensure you are using the updated form (attached) when placing future orders.

If you have any queries, please do not hesitate to contact me. I will be contacting some Clubs shortly as there are outstanding payments due.

LIONS HEADER CARDS

The header card will need to be updated with the new minimum donation price.

We have created an easy solution to update the pricing. Print, cut and glue the attached sheet with the new pricing of 80c for all existing Lions header cards.

DAMAGED OR LOST INTRANSIT

If a product is damaged during transit, contact Dollar Sweets. You will need to provide details of the extent and type of damage and the quantity and type of goods affected. Dollar Sweets will lodge a complaint with the freight company on behalf of the relevant Lions Club.

Photographic evidence of damaged goods may be requested so it is advised to hold onto any damaged goods until you have spoken to Dollar Sweets.

Goods lost in transit will only be replaced once confirmation has been received from the courier that the order is unrecoverable. Once confirmation has been received, replacement goods will be sent on the next available dispatch day.

Dollar Sweets must be notified as soon as possible of any damaged or lost in transit goods. Credits claims may be rejected if too much time has lapsed.





FROM SUPPORTING HER HUSBAND TO LEADING LIONS WITH EXCELLENCE

A woman who became involved with Lions to support her husband has been recognised with one of the organisation's most prestigious awards. Marcia Jensen, secretary of the Blackall Range Lions Club, has been presented with a Melvin Jones Fellowship, which recognises outstanding contributions to Lionism or the community.

Marcia joined Lions to support her husband Peter when he and others formed a Lions Club Branch to serve the communities of Montville, Flaxton and Mapleton on 12th February 2019. She has been the founding Charter Secretary, Vice-President, Marketing and Communications Chair, the Range Views Newsletter Editor and has developed and run morning teas. She ran the Taste of the Hinterland events at the Barn on Flaxton, coordinated Club dinners, tirelessly iced Christmas cakes every year, assisted with compiling the annual Blackall Range Calendar and has filled the Secretary's position last year and this year.

"In creating a Lions Club Branch, I had to find a President, Treasurer and a Secretary. I am sure Marcia had no idea when she joined Lions to help me get a Club started, that she would get so involved," said Peter, the Club President.

Peter felt she was deserving of an award and sought the Melvin Jones Fellowship for her at the suggestion of other members. They managed to sneak it past Marcia, who had no idea she was in line for such an honour until the presentation at the June 22 changeover dinner. "I thought the awards were done and then Peter said there was a special award and he began reading out what this person had done," Marcia said.

"I thought, 'This sounds like me,' and when he said it was a Melvin Jones Fellowship, I just about fell off the chair," she said.

INCIDENT REPORTS

An incident report is a tool that documents any event that may or may not have caused injuries to a person or damage to an asset. It is used to capture injuries and accidents, near hits, property and equipment damage, health and safety issues, security breaches and misconducts. Lions MD201 has two incident reports. One is for incidents involving children which comes under the Child Safe Officer which I will not refer to here.

The other incident report has been formulated to comply with ISO3100, the International Standard for Risk Management, as the Australian Government has adopted the International Standards Organisation (ISO) publications. It applies to any incident that has happened or could have happened i.e. any untoward event.

This report is on the Insurance page of the MD201 Website for downloading when needed. It is important that as much information as possible is included in the report. This report should be distributed to:

- Club President and Secretary
- District Governor
- District Safety Coordinator
- LIONS RISK MANAGEMENT CONSULTANT

The Lions MD Risk Management Consultant will follow through with any further distribution needed to the MD201 Insurance, Risk Management, Child Safe Committee members.

These reports could be needed in the event of a common law action taken at a later date so it is important that every incident is documented fully along with any further actions taken with regard to the incident. In the words of Justice Lionel Murphy, "In a Court of Law, if it ain't written down, it didn't happen."

JOY RIDE

Sometimes a person just needs to get out of the house. And sometimes that person just needs a little extra help getting out. The Walker Lions in Minnesota are determined to be those helpers. As part of the Cycling Without Age program, they hope to help their seniors — including retired veterans — breathe some fresh air, feel the wind in their hair, and enjoy the company of friends. Although known as "The Land of 10,000 Lakes," Minnesota actually has 11,842 lakes listed on their state inventory, and many are accompanied by scenic hiking and bicycling trails.

With the aid of the Lions' new trishaw, or Triobike Taxi, from Texas, the seniors can skip the peddling part of bicycling. They will be front and centre, enjoying the sights while somebody else does the work from behind. The trishaw is a light, three-wheeled bike driven by a trained cyclist who can transport two passengers anywhere a normal bicycle could go. The passengers ride up front in what resembles a carriage seat, and the cyclist, or "pilot", pedals and steers from behind. Although the Cycling Without Age program started in Denmark in 2012 and is in fifty countries and several states now, this is the first north of the Twin Cities in Minnesota.



The Lions, along with Cass County Statewide Health Improvement Partnership and May Creek Senior Living, began working on the project in the fall of 2019, and contributions for the US\$10,000 bicycle came from various community sources. But shortly after their trishaw was assembled and ready to ride, COVID-19 Club President arrived, says Gary Walworth.

Pandemic restrictions put a quick stop to the program, but for a brief period in late summer, there was time for a few people to safely try it out. People were eager to ride, but many more are on a list, waiting, like the Lions, for the virus to be gone and for spring to arrive.

Rides for the seniors will be about an hour long and coordinated from five sites including churches, the senior living centre, and the American Legion Club.

Each site will have a coordinator and their own trained pilots, so the pilots and the passengers can develop a camaraderie while traveling over the many trails in northern Minnesota. Women from Hope Lutheran Church in Walker made quilts to keep passengers warm. "Everybody who has been out has been just thrilled with it," says Walworth. "Now more than ever our senior citizens need to get out and enjoy life. Once we have beaten this pandemic — and we will — the Walker Lions will be ready."

CHILDREN'S VISION SCREENING PROGRAM

WHAT SCREENING ACTIVITIES ARE PERFORMED?

Spot Vision Screener



To detect any vision issues associated with:
Myopia (near-sightedness)
Hyperopia (far-sightedness)
Astigmatism (blurred vision)
Anisometropia (unequal refractive power)
Binocular Vision (eye misalignment)
Anisocoria (unequal pupil size)

Screener stands one metre away from the child.

A state-of-the-art portable camera is lined up with the child's eyes. Once in view, the machine takes a picture and formulates a report.

Colour Vision.

The purpose is to determine if the child perceives colour as most people do. Using a set of 7 cards, one by one the child is asked if they can distinguish the number on each card. Numbers are formed using a variety of different dots on contrasting coloured background.



Stereo Depth Perception.



The purpose is to assess the binocular function of the eyes at near tasks. Wearing polarising spectacles, the child is asked if they can see or "pick up" the fly jumping out of the page in 3D fashion.

Visual Acuity

The purpose is to determine how sharp a child's vision is at longer distances. A symbol chart is placed 3 metres away from the child at head height. Covering one eye at a time, the child is asked to read out shapes which are visible, line by line.

GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES

COULD HOOKWORM SALIVA LEAD TO A NEW TREATMENT FOR TYPE 2 DIABETES

Sometimes medical breakthroughs appear in the most unexpected forms and that's why researchers are hopeful that the humble hookworm could hold the key to a new diabetes treatment.

We cringe when we read about the Sunshine Coast woman who contracted hookworm whilst holidaying at An Bang Beach in Vietnam, yet Queensland scientists have been voluntarily infecting themselves with the same worms for the sake of medical research.



After the worms burrowed into her skin the forty-two years old woman suffered swollen feet with intense itching, tingling, then pain as she felt the worms wriggling when her medication began to kill the infestation.

Untreated the parasites would have travelled through her blood to her trachea, and then be swallowed before ending up in the small intestine. Upon arrival it would dig its teeth into the intestinal wall and begin to drink her blood.

But using the hookworms powers for good instead

of evil, two research teams have turned to these parasites in their quest to find effective treatments for Type 2 Diabetes and Coeliac Disease.

Researchers at James Cook University and Macrobiome Therapeutics believe the antiinflammatory properties of the creatures saliva may help prevent or delay the development of Type 2 Diabetes.

Molecular Parasitologist Dr Alex Loukas said "If the project is successful and we come up with a drug (For Diabetes) inspired by parasitic worms...that will be a game changer.

Studies in developing countries found that people who took deworming medication to remove parasites became more susceptible to conditions like Diabetes.

"Parasitic worms secrete all sorts of compounds that have anti-inflammatory properties to stop your immune system from flushing (the worms) out" he said.

Meanwhile researchers at the Australian Institute of Tropical Health and Medicine and the Centre for Chronic Disease Prevention at James Cook University are collaborating in a world first trial, infecting people with worms to test their effectiveness in preventing Type 2 Diabetes and Metabolic Syndrome.

We now know that most societies that still have high levels of worm infestation do not have Type 2 Diabetes, while communities and cities where worms have been mostly eradicated are experiencing a dramatic rise in metabolic diseases.



GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES CONTINUED

Type 2 Diabetes is a disease of chronic inflammation which originates in the fat tissue which is found around the abdominal area. Parasitic worms are masters of controlling inflammation and experiments with mice have shown that worm infections are strongly protective against Diabetes, a condition that affects over one million Australians.

The phase one trial will examine the safety and tolerability of low doses of human hookworms in healthy women aged 18 – 44 who are on the road to developing Type 2 Diabetes, and who already have one or two other features of metabolic syndrome, ie high blood pressure and high insulin levels.

This trial will be critical for determining whether we should start looking at the active molecules that worms release into the body to control metabolism, which could be produced as a drug for preventing Type 2 Diabetes.

The Institute of Tropical Health and Medicine is also working on a \$2.5 million project to genetically modify hookworms to protect frontline soldiers against chemical and biological attacks.

Diabetes Australia figures show two hundred and eighty people develop diabetes every day – one every five minutes – and that hundreds of thousands are probably undiagnosed.

The disease is the leading cause of preventable blindness in Australia and can lead to amputations as well as heart and kidney disease.

Handy little fellas these Hookworms!!!



GLOBAL CAUSE ... ENVIRONMENT REDUCING WATER USAGE IN THE HOME



- Reducing water use in your home reduces your environmental impact and saves money.
- New water-efficient taps, showerheads, toilets, and appliances can significantly reduce your water use with no change to your lifestyle.
- Reducing your hot water use saves energy as well and can significantly reduce your energy costs.
- Investing in new appliances may save you money in the long run because of reduced water and energy costs.
- The Water Efficiency Labelling and Standards scheme allows you to compare the water efficiency of similar products. Check the label to choose the most efficient product you can afford that suits your needs.
- Dripping taps and leaks can rapidly use a lot of water. Ensure drips and leaks are fixed promptly.
- Small changes to your habits can also save water. You can:
 - o take shorter showers and not leave taps running unnecessarily
 - o only use the washing machine or dishwasher when they are full, or adjust your load settings for smaller loads
 - o use eco cycles on machines where possible
 - o scrape dishes before washing, instead of rinsing.
 - o Watering the gardens/lawns. When is the best time to do this?
 - o Washing the car
 - Washing the windows, drive ways,
 - Cleaning the floor/ shampooing the carpets
 - o Topping up the swimming pool
- All of the above adds to our water usage. Therefore, what is an alternative method to cut back. Install a rainwater tank to use on the majority of outdoor cleaning projects, and water the garden. **Why not sweep a path instead of using water.**
- On average in South East Queensland each person uses approx. **161 litres of water per person per day**, if we look at the weekly use per week is roughly comes **to 1,127litres per week** and so on.
- Usage will depend entirely on our seasons, e.g. Summer will be much higher than in Winter because it is hotter, hydration is essential, we are outside more often and the list goes on. Whereas winter is much colder we appear to use less energy, hence our intake of fluids is lower.
- Why not take a survey? By reading your water meter on the 1st August then again on the 31st August and calculate how much water has been used in your home for that month. Do it again for September and October and compare your usage. Why not check your next water bill and compare.

Until next month be frugal with your water usage.
