
I thank you all for stepping up to your role. Sometimes we must step outside our comfort zone but trust me, it is well worth it.

### SERVICE TEAM REPORT

This year, your Service Team consists of myself, Debbie Williams, as your Chairperson, ably assisted once more by Chris Sang, from the Lions Club of Brisbane Inner North and Danielle Runge, from the Lions Club of Kallangur. Welcome to the team Danielle!

We have three goals to work towards for this Lions year and they are:

- To have 80% of all Clubs reporting their Service and Fundraising Activities via the new Lion Portal, once it is up and running.
- To increase the number of Clubs that have a nominated Club Service Chair to do this reporting.
- For each Club in our District to take on one new project, whether that be Children of Courage, Clean Up Australia Day and so on. Note that we are encouraging a new Service project, not a Fundraising project, something that will get our Clubs out in public assisting their community once again.

Why are we encouraging these types of Service projects? The more we are in our community in our shirts, the more we are actively promoting our Clubs. EVERY SERVICE PROJECT IS A MEMBERSHIP OPPORTUNITY.

Once the new Lion Portal is online and active for us to use, it will make reporting our monthly Membership and Service simpler as to access both MyLCI and MyLion, you will go to the same place on the LCI website.

Once there, you will notice some changes to reporting of Service, they being:

- Service project reporting is the main focus. What the project is/was, how many volunteer hours it took to complete and how many people were served by this Service project.
- They also want to know about the Fundraising you have done and any donations your Club has made.

- HOWEVER, Fundraising is not considered to be a Service project. So Bunnings Sausage Sizzles or sales of Christmas Cakes etc is to be recorded in Fundraising.
- If all or part of the money raised by your fundraising is used for example, to buy toiletries and food staples to put into care packs for the homeless, then this part is recorded as a Service project, again listing how many people served, how many volunteer hours to put the care packs together and so on.
- Some of our Clubs are lucky enough to have arrangements with their local Council and facilities to run a café for a number of hours each week. Again, this is a fundraiser, not a Service project and like a Bunnings Sausage Sizzle, is NOT a Hunger project. Please do not record it as such. Hunger projects are those where you are providing food/drink to truly needy members of our communities, not people who are enticed by the smell of onions cooking on a barbeque.

If you have any questions about what should and shouldn't be recorded and where, please give me a call to discuss the project in question. We're looking forward to seeing the Lion Portal up and running and our team are only too happy to assist our clubs as they make the transition.



### BLACKALL RANGE HELP FOR THE HOMELESS

Blackall Range Lions Club covers such a small geographical area - the villages of Montville and Mapleton and localities of Flaxton, Dulong and Kureelpa, that one would expect that homelessness would not be such a problem here. Compared to some other places it is not, but for the individuals and families affected, it is indeed problem, the need of individual families being just as great here as it is for families anywhere else.

We know of and are supporting several families on the Range and are also aware of quite a few others who come up from Nambour to park in the quiet carparks of National Parks, State Forests and other locations at night because they feel safer sleeping in their cars away from larger population centres.

Blackall Range Lions has several small projects underway to support people in this situation. We have always provided occasional hampers through our two primary schools to families the Principals have told us need help. It is now done on a more regular basis. There are families who have had to take up camping in showgrounds or staying with relatives in nearby towns after regular rent rises have forced them out of their

homes. They'd like their children to have continuity in their schooling, especially as their present 'homes' are likely to be temporary, so our club is supporting them with fuel vouchers. We have given the tuckshop convenor of one school a debit card to buy supplementary food for those children she and the Chaplain feel need a little more.

We've also become aware of women of pension age who have been made homeless due to rent rises. There are not cabins in the caravan park for all of them, and we've been able to help one who had to move into an unsealed shed 45 km away. A couple of members helped pack up her belongings and move them into a much safer and less isolated studio apartment

back on the Range when one became available for her. Another small project about which we are speaking with the school Principals is a 'food

sculpture' competition between classes. This would involve classes collecting packet & tinned food over a week or two, and then building a structure with it before it is donated.

On a larger scale, we are helping those who travel up from Nambour through our aid to the Nambour Community Centre. Like similar organisations, the NCC provides social workers, showers, food, meals, warm clothing, and welcoming places to sit and chat or play board games – it gets very lonely if you live in your car. Some of their clients are not homeless but now pay such high rents that they have insufficient left to buy enough food. Our club has collection boxes at each dinner meeting, and in addition, recently gave the Centre \$1,000 which they will use for less common situations when they arise. The manager mentioned one

case where a mother couldn't afford new shoes for a growing child, so providing shoes that fit would allow her son to continue at school without awkward questions being asked by staff and other pupils.

These are all band aid solutions to a growing problem, but never-the-less, they are making a world of difference to the people who find themselves in need.

### CAKE & MINT PORTFOLIO July 2023

#### CAKES -

As you are aware we had our Cake and Mint Seminar early this month where quite a lot of information on both Cakes and Mints was given.

I have now received copies of everything that was discussed, a detailed report will shortly be coming to every Club for an update.

What is in this article is simply a snapshot of the relevant points.

Firstly, and most importantly there will be another price increase this year. As you are all aware when you do your own grocery shopping and pay your own house bills, everything from a sprig of mint to a bottle of coffee and all in between has gone up in price and in some cases still rising week after week.

The reason for the price rise, due to increases –

Eggs gone up by 60%

Flour risen by 38%

Sugar by 30%

Fuel levies up by 30%

Fruit varies in price and we used 280,000kgs of fruit in 2022.

Gas and electricity have had significant increases and still they rise. So you can see Traditional Foods dilemma. I know we can still sell these great products and keep Q3 at the head of the pack.

The RRP for 2023 is as follows -

1.5kg Cake \$20.00

1.0kg Cake \$16.00

Pudding \$16.00

I know that this is not the news you hoped to hear but unfortunately it is a sign of the times. We all know that we do have a great range of products and that the public at large do like and support this major fundraising programme for our Clubs no matter where we are situated.

So, come on, let's think positive about this and let's get our orders in early and get out there promoting and selling our Cakes and Puddings.

Let's continue to lead the way and to show all other Districts how it is done for success. Another great move by Traditional Foods for this year is that they have partnered in every capital city to secure a product holding warehouse.

So all of our orders will come from stock held here in Brisbane, at Acacia Ridge, so this should cut down on the problems with waiting for stock.

As at the time of our meeting, every warehouse was at least to 80+% capacity and they were still baking to make sure that they all have 100% come ordering time from 1st July.

#### PLEASE BE AWARE THAT THE NEW ORDER FORM WILL ONLY BE AVAILABLE ON THE WEBSITE FROM THE 1<sup>ST</sup> JULY.

As promised, I will forward a detailed report shortly.

Remember if you have purchased cakes between January and now, June, those accounts MUST be cleared (paid for) now or by the end of this month, they cannot hang over after the 30<sup>th</sup> June, so please see to it that this is done immediately, if not sooner.

#### MINTS -

What can I say, we still have a few issues with Dollar Sweets, although they say that they are aware of what is happening, they are trying to fix the problem.

Trouble is that they still have many orders to fill to catch up and as we are not at that point yet, orders that get to them now will be put into the waiting pile to be done.

They promise that we will be notified on their progress and once this is done, orders should then reach them as normal and be processed and delivered in hopefully, a timely manner.

Again, there will be a report on Dollar Sweets and what suggestions have been put forward and what they promise that they can do to enhance the range and get this product moving again.

### RISK MANAGEMENT

ISO is the International Organisation for Standardisation. It is an independent, non-governmental international organization with a membership of one hundred and sixty-eight national standards bodies. Standards Australia is a member of ISO. In Australia, we are now expected to use the ISO standard in defining such things as the correct date format and such expressions as Risk Management.

According to the Risk Management Standard, ISO 31000, risk is the "effect of uncertainty on objectives" and an effect is a positive or negative deviation from what is expected. The following will explain what this means.


ISO 31000 recognises that all of us operate in an uncertain world. Whenever we try to achieve an objective, there's always the chance that things will not go according to plan. Every step has an element of risk that needs to be managed and every outcome is uncertain. Whenever we try to achieve an objective, we don't always get the results we expect. Sometimes we get positive results and sometimes we get negative results and occasionally we get both.

The traditional definition of risk combines three elements: it starts with a potential event and then combines its probability with its potential severity. A high-risk event would have a high likelihood of occurring and a severe impact if it occurred.

While ISO 31000 defines risk in a new and unusual way, the old and the new definitions are largely compatible. Both definitions talk about the same phenomena but from two different perspectives. ISO thinks of risk in goal-oriented terms while the traditional definition thinks of risk in event-oriented terms. These two definitions can and do coexist. They're two different ways of talking about the same phenomena.

ISO provides a conceptual definition of risk while the traditional formulation operationalizes this general definition: it explains how to quantify risk. It argues that the amount or level of risk can be calculated by combining probability and severity. Many people are resistant to this change however to ensure understanding of the results of

risk analysis, the standard definition needs to be accepted and used.



The MD201 Risk Management Manual is based on the provisions of ISO 31000 so it is a bit different to other previous publications in this field however we do need to conform to the International standard.

### <u>GLOBAL MEMBERSHIP</u> APPROACH FOR CLUBS

"The time to repair the roof is when the sun is shining." – JFK

Many of our sixty-eight Clubs in the Q3 district are doing very well in terms of membership and service.

However, as some Clubs have found, that can change very quickly.... dropping membership, lack of interest in service activities, declining attendance at meetings etc are some indicators that a Club could be in trouble.

A proven process that has been used by many Clubs across Australia and the world to help Clubs grow and plan is the Global Membership Approach.

The process involves Clubs sitting down and creating a plan in terms of membership, service, and community.

Where do you start? Start by discussing.

"If we continue as we are, where do you think out Club will be in 5 years' time?"

Look at information such as Club growth, service activities, retention of existing members and other data relevant to your Club.

Your Zonie has a copy of the Club Health Assessment for their Zone.

Ask to see how your Club is tracking in terms of the data.

The Club could then complete a SWOT analysis. It looks at your Club's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats.

From the responses in the SWOT your Club can onto develop some simple goals that can be achieved in terms of membership, Club operations, service and sharing success with the community.

Your Zonie has been recently trained in this process and will be only too happy to assist your Club with this.

Members of the District Global Action Team are also able to assist. They are a valuable, experienced team. You just need to ask!

Our District has a 5 Year Strategy in place. Some of these goals can be adapted for clubs to use. There is a copy of the District Plan on the previous page of this newsletter.

### MALENY BLACKALL RANGE CELEBRATE FORTY YEARS

The Maleny Blackall Range Lions Club celebrated forty years of service to the Maleny Blackall Range Community at our recent dinner meeting. The Maleny Blackall Range Club was chartered on the 15th April 1983 and Roger Jackson (deceased) was the first President. At charter night twenty-nine members were installed as the first members of the Club. Chris Symons a current member of our Club attended the Installation dinner at the RSL Maleny and remembers it as being a formal affair with one hundred and twenty guests. He recalls the celebrations going on all weekend.

Numbers dwindled over the years down to about nine members and when Bill Crawford was inducted in 2005 as President, he set about rebuilding the Club to be the strong Club it is today.

Clarke Alexander is the longest serving member of the Club at this time and he and his wife Lyn introduced the "Iced and decorated Christmas cakes" back in Bill's time to raise awareness of our Lions Club. This project is still popular today.

Around 2006 Colin Sinclair, who has over fifty years' service as a Lion, together with his wife Sue, came up with the idea of the Welcome Dinner (now known as the "Meet and Greet") and this event has proven to be our Annual Signature Lions Project. This event is held every September or early October and with the support of local businesses enables new residents of Maleny to learn about the services our community offers and to meet like-minded people.

The first woman President was Una Robinson 2000- 2002 who now lives in Beerwah, followed by Chrissie Dittmann in 2002-2003 and then Helen Johnston in 2014 and currently 2020 -2023.

The Club's biggest growth in membership was twenty members in 2014 and another twenty members in 2015 during Peter Jensen's year as President. Our Club grew to seventy members and for practical reasons split into two Clubs to service the Range currently The Maleny Blackall Range Lions Club and the Blackall Range Lions Club and the Blackall Range Lions Club has fostered the formation of the Mooloolah Valley Lions Club and the Beerwah Lions Club.

Our Club has won the Maleny District Sports Club Organisation of the Year Award several times and the Lions District 201Q3 Clubs' Year Award (out of seventy-five clubs in the district) twice.

The Club has a proud record of service to our local community and long may this service continue.



### LIONS BUSINESS PARTNERSHIPS

Lions Australia have actively been seeking companies to develop partnerships with that will enhance Lions profiles within the business world and give credit to companies that are supporting Lion's projects. Recently, District 201Q3 has participated in two such enterprises.

On Thursday 8 June, SIKA, a specialty company that produces chemicals and sealants worldwide, held a Community Service project at their Brendale depot. Employees from both the Brendale and Pinkenba depots were released from work in order to participate in putting together Care Packs for the homeless. Fifty employees were involved in the packing. The company had gone all out with a Pizza truck providing free lunch, games such as Football target, oversized Chessboard, Musicians and tables decorated with balloons. They really tried to create a party atmosphere.

Alan Brooks and I attended to represent Lions and thank the company for the opportunity to work together. Once the Care packs were done, they were loaded into Alan's car to be delivered to a local charity, Encircle, that does a lot of work with the homeless in the Pine Rivers area. He and President Helen, then presented them to the Encircle office.

We hope to grow the relationship between the Brisbane SIKA and Q3 Lions so that we can deliver more projects that benefit people in our communities.













The second partnership was one that began last year in Q3. Haymes Paints, a national Australian company, made the offer that for every local Lions Club that ran a Breakfast Barbeque for their customers, they would donate \$500 to the Australian Lions Foundation and reimburse the costs involved for the barbeque.

The company donated \$28000 last year as fifty-six Clubs Australia wide, ran a Breakfast Barbeque for their stores in numerous localities. The Lions Club of Brisbane Inner North ran the event on behalf of Q3 last year at the Newmarket store.

The same deal applied this year but Haymes Paints only offered fourteen stores Australia wide. Unfortunately, in five of those locations, we didn't have Clubs in the vicinity but nine Clubs were available to run the Breakfast Barbeque for their customers. That means that this year, the company was only able to donate \$4500 to the Australian Lions Foundation. We hope to increase this next year by persuading the company to propose more stores as they did last year.

A big shout out to the Lions Club of Brisbane Bunya, who this year took their trailer to the Newmarket store and cooked up fifty egg and bacon rolls for the tradies and clients. Once again, Q3 were ready to step up and not let the opportunity pass us by so well done to all those involved!

We had some great discussions at the Social Media breakout groups at the Club Forums. Here are the key points that we discussed:

- There is no simple way to determine which is the best platform for your club to use. It depends on the messages your expectations your audience your budget and your technical skills.
- However, '.....if there's one social media site where virtually any business can thrive, it has to be Facebook.
- Use your website for static information (people go to it) and your social media for regular updates (goes to people)
- Make sure you have at least two people who add and delete roles
- Have a mix of promotion, celebrational, information and fun on your social media
- Promote events before, during and after
- Consider your audience when posting not all posts need the same audience
  - encouraging members to share posts on their page
  - o posting on community pages
  - encouraging MPs and Councilors to promote your activities on their social media
  - tag organisations you are working with so you get on their page
- Make sure your post has sufficient appeal to stop someone scrolling:
  - o photos
  - o videos
  - o graphics
- Be creative with photos and videos don't rely on 'standards' e.g. two people holding a cheque

### AROUND THE WORLD WITH LIONS LEOS HELPING THOSE LIVING WITH HIV/AIDS

#### THE TWENTY-NINTH IN A SERIES OF ARTICLES SOURCED BY LION LYN PYSDEN

The Coppell High School Leo Club in Texas reached out to seven non-profit organizations in their quest to find a community project. What they chose proved that a little kindness and conversation over a warm, home-cooked meal can go a long way.

On five occasions the Coppell Leos AIDS Supper Club in partnership with AIDS Services of Dallas provided meals to the sixty-five residents of Hillcrest House, a residential facility for individuals and families living with HIV/AIDS. Isabel Mascarenhas, then president of the Leos and now service chair for the University of Texas Lions Club, was the driving force behind the effort.

The Leos made five visits to Hillcrest House in Dallas over five months, and with the help of an <u>LCIF Leo Service Grant</u>, budgeted US\$350 for food and supplies per visit. The grants are available to support service projects that are developed and implemented by Leos.

The Leos planned each meal, varying them to include a Christmas dinner, Italian, Mexican, Chinese and American fare, did the shopping, cooked the meals, and served them, visiting with the residents at each dinner. They began with menu planning, then grocery shopping on Friday, preparations at Leos' homes on Saturday, and cooking and serving on Sunday, ending only when the leftovers were packaged for the residents. "None of us were amazing cooks, but the people appreciated it, and we enjoyed it," says Mascarenhas. "There is a lot of stigma around people living with AIDS. It was an eye-opening experience to speak with them on a more a personal level and get to know these people who have lived a completely different life than ours."

Coppell Lion Dan Madden, in his fifth year as adviser to the Leo club, says the Supper Club project not only taught the Leos about implementing a project, but writing a successful grant proposal, and working together while helping those in need. "It was a significant commitment for a high school club," says Madden. "Our Leos did a tremendous job."

Mascarenhas, whose father, Kevin Mascarenhas, is a Coppell Lion and an inspiration to his daughter, was named 2019 International Leo of the Year in MD 2X 1. She credits Madden for encouraging young people to stay in the 36-member Leo club. "Not only is he there to make sure we get what we need and we get where we are supposed to be, but to share ideas for things that we can help with," she says. "He gave us opportunity, and that's an important part of being a Leo. … I'll be a part of Lions forever."

### CHILDREN'S VISION SCREENING PROGRAM

#### FACTS ABOUT CHILDREN'S VISION

- I in 5 children have an undetected vision problem. Lions Vision Screening teams are operational in every Australian State and Territory and we already have over 55 registered screeners in our Q3 District.
- Vision disorders can have a profound effect on a child's growth and development
- Up to 80% of a child's learning happens through their eyes
- Most children accept vision problems and adapt
- They rarely complain as they believe everyone sees the world just like they do
- Once detected, most eye conditions in children can be easily corrected
- All children should have a full eye examination before starting school and regularly as they progress through their education

#### SCREENING FOR CHILDREN

Vision screening is not a new initiative. It has been around in various forms for some years. Currently, some health services and governments provide vision screenings, however, they can often be limited in relation to the age of children eligible and the type of screenings performed. In Queensland, State Schools are offered a service to their Prep students and there is a substantial cost involved. Our LEHP Children's Screening Program is free to all students because it is administered by trained Lions members. It also provides a wider range of screening activities.

LEHP's Children's Vision Screening Program is the most comprehensive program currently available in Australia. Since September last year, our trained Q3 screeners have visited 9 schools. We have screened 429 children and have referred 82 students with a range of visual problems for further optical tests with an Optometrist. We are making a huge difference in the lives of our young people with the potential of greatly enhancing their educational outcomes and future development.

At the moment, our Lions screening teams are based in the Moreton Bay, Brisbane North, Sunshine Coast and Sunshine Coast Hinterland areas. In the second half of 2023, I would like to expand the program to the western areas of Brisbane, Ipswich and further west to the Toowoomba area.

In the next District Newsletter, I want to expand further on this scheme and also explain the types of experiences that the children undergo as well as the equipment that we use in doing our screening.
