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

- 2) **Open Communication** is vitally important to the success of your Club. Encourage input from members. Use your Club meetings, newsletter, Facebook and Website to communicate Club activities.
- 3) **Visit Another Club** This is a great way to build relationships, share ideas and consider procedures seen at another Club meeting or social activity.
- 4) **Share Praise Freely** Important to all members is positive reinforcement for a job done well. Often, simple acknowledgements are best a special

- thank you during a Club or committee meeting, a personal note of thanks, a word of encouragement.
- 5) **Find the Key to Involvement** You want to involve each member in your Club by getting to know them and selecting activities that they want to join. Active involvement is essential to keep members. Share happy occasions birthdays, anniversaries, a special achievement of a spouse or child.
- 6) Attendance Cues Pay careful attention to attendance trends. Not attending meetings is one of the first signs of lack of member interest. Make a list of members who are "slipping." If they have missed meetings, call them to find out why and how you can help.
- 7) **Scramble Seating Arrangements** Change seating arrangements at meetings from time to time to allow all members to become better acquainted.
- 8) **Lion on the Month** Highlight one member each month and have them give a short talk about something in their life. It could be business, travel, interests...
- 9) New Members Make Great Greeters Have new members and their sponsor/s serve as greeters for Club functions for the first several months of their membership. It's a great way for them to meet all Club members.
- 10) **Try Trimming Time** Do you feel that your agenda is as lean as it can be, but your meetings are still running too long? Examine the content of your agenda items and try trimming just a little time from a few items.
- 11) **Mix it Up** Add a new quick agenda item to boost morale (such as suggestion of the month or recognizing a member who went beyond the call of duty).
- 12) **Give Ownership** Encourage members to lead an activity. Members will feel needed and motivated to do more in the Club. This is great for succession planning!

CAMP VALTELLINA - ITALY

Mikki Doonan, a Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award participant with Caloundra West Club initially did her Gold Residential project attending Lions Youth Exchange Camp Noorla Yo-Long in January. Her uniform was sponsored by Maleny Blackall Range Club as the Award Centre was attached to them at the time. She was inspired by Sue Newton at that camp to attend an overseas camp while travelling for six months in Europe before going back to university to complete her Honours research year in late July where her area of study is developmental biology, neuroscience, and bioinformatics.

Mikki's comments: "It was indeed a wonderful and life-changing experience to attend the homestay experience and to participate in Camp Valtellina. I was hosted for one week in the Lombardy region of Northern Italy by an Italian family, of which the mother, father, and grandmother were Lions members. The homestay experience was invaluable and opened my eyes to the customs, traditions, and lifestyles of some Italian families. I practised speaking Italian, learned how to make tiramisu, and attended an Italian high school for a day! I formed a bond with the family that will continue for many years to come and am very grateful to have had this opportunity.



Camp Valtellina was organised by MD108 Lions Youth Camp and Exchange Chairperson, Cinzia Franchetti, and Camp Director Mario Trecarichi. The camp was based in the small Italian town of Tirano, Valtellina, in the province of Sondrio in the Lombardy region of Northern Italy. Just 1km from the Switzerland border!

There were twelve youth participants aged 16-21 from eleven countries including Australia, Brazil, United States of America, Germany, Finland, Turkey, Greece, Israel, Hungary, Romania and Lithuania. We embodied the sentiment of Lions Youth Exchange members, by fostering a relationship built on understanding and appreciating each other's cultures.

The two-week camp was fantastic – filled with community engagement activities, Italian immersion days, nature, hiking, swimming, sightseeing, and delicious Italian food. I went on a boat in Lago di Como, ate panzerotti at Luinis in Milan, and travelled on the red Bernina Glacier Express train from Tirano to Switzerland! We visited the Limbiate Lions Guide Dog Center (Servizio Cani Guida Per Ciechi), where we learnt about the amazing efforts and teamwork of Lions members and volunteers who donate the invaluable gift of guide dogs to visually challenged and blind people. We watched a presentation, toured the facilities, and saw some very cute Labrador puppies."

Mikki is obviously an advocate of our Lions Youth Exchange camps as she attended Camp Krokodile at Currimundi for two years pre-covid as a junior leader and coincidentally, the son of her homestay family attended Camp Krokodile this year.

As part of the "Speak Up Now" initiative, Val and Sherryl are collecting old mobile phones. These phones are cleared by IT experts and then distributed as Safe Phones to people who are victims of abuse so they have a safe phone, that is not tracked by the abuser, to contact family and friends. This Safe Phone enables communication which is critical for ongoing safety and support.

The Lions Club of Maleny Blackall Range has provided financial support to the Speak Up Now group, as well as assisting with catering at educational seminars and will continue to assist this fantastic initiative to help deal with the growing Domestic Violence and Elder Abuse affecting our community.

CAKE & MINT PORTFOLIO September 2023

CAKES -

I have just been double checking everything to do with the Cake Programme and I notice that there is an extra step in there this year.

For those Clubs that go in through the Lions Australia website you will be faced with the following steps –

- Get Involved (place cursor over it)
- Move cursor over Fundraising
- Click on Mints and Cakes
- Find Cake Order Form
- You'll see that the UserID is shown.(UserID cakes)
- ♣ You'll need the Password.

 (westons2020)
- ♣ Then you will need to Download it

I know this is ridiculous, but this is what you will need. I would suggest that once you have downloaded it save it to your computer and then you will not have to go through this procedure again.

Remember too, that there is another mandatory field been added, please fill this in as it will make your delivery easier particularly if you are having it delivered to your den, or to a business, if you tick the appropriate box then this will help the courier get it to where you want it delivered.

It is important for those Clubs who have an unmanned Den, by doing this it will force the courier to make sure that they contact you prior to your delivery so that a member can be at the Den to accept your delivery.

Why not consider your order for this year and try and get it in earlier than usual, you will then guarantee to get the stock you want. Having said that we should not have too many stock problems this year as we now have our own holding warehouse at Acacia Ridge where our deliveries will come from.

LIONS HEADER CARDS

The header card will need to be updated with the new minimum donation price. We have created an easy solution to update the pricing.

Print, cut and glue the attached sheet with the new pricing of 80c for all existing Lions header cards.

DAMAGED OR LOST INTRANSIT

If a product is damaged during transit, contact Dollar Sweets. You will need to provide details of the extent and type of damage and the quantity and type of goods affected. Dollar Sweets will lodge a complaint with the freight company on behalf of the relevant Lions Club. Photographic evidence of damaged goods may be requested so it is advised to hold onto any damaged goods until you have spoken to Dollar Sweets.

Goods lost in transit will only be replaced once confirmation has been received from the courier that the order is unrecoverable. Once confirmation has been received, replacement goods will be sent on the next available dispatch day.

Dollar Sweets must be notified as soon as possible of any damaged or lost in transit goods. Credits claims may be rejected if too much time has lapsed.

GOLD AT CALOUNDRA WEST

Four participants from the Lions Club of Caloundra West Duke of Edinburgh Award Centre were presented with their certificates recently at the Brisbane City Hall by the Governor of Queensland, Dr. Jeanette Young.

Jasper, Callum, Hannah and Edan persevered through covid lockdowns, bushfire seasons when all adventurous journeys came to a halt, and floods in some areas, and illness, to complete at least three levels of the Dukes International Award. Callum started his "journey" with the Queensland Bridge Award when he was just 11 ½ and proudly wore all five of his badges to the presentation.

They all kayaked down Pumistone Passage from Bell's Pocket boat ramp at Caloundra to Bongaree jetty three days later, battling rain, strong winds and tides all the way, staying overnight at Mission Point for two nights. And this journey was just for one of their journeys for their Silver Awards.

Three of them sailed on the 30ft, two masted, gaff rigged schooner South Passage into unprotected waters outside the reef for their Gold adventurous journeys and they all have tales of experiences that really challenged them.

They all completed one hour per week for fifty-two weeks activities that included a non-sweaty skill, something physical, service to their community as well as their two, four-day adventurous journeys. These activities included learning wildlife photography, learning to drive, ballet, rowing, fly fishing, Leos, Edmund Rice camps and surf lifesaving patrols.

They all completed a five-day residential project and cleaning the headstones at Witta Cemetery was the activity chosen by three of them. Rob Hobson, Maleny Blackall Range's current President and previous Award Centre principal officer presented them with trophies made from the worn-out scrubbing brushes at celebration morning at Little Mountain Common prior to the main presentation. Deb O'Reilly, principal officer of the Award Centre at Caloundra West, presented them with their badges.



Hannah, Maleny Blackall Range's Youth of the Year winner 2022 and 2023 gave the speech on behalf of all ninety Gold Awardees in front of the two hundred family members, distinguished guests and supporters at the City Hall.

The current hashtag for the Award is #WORLDREADY, and these four young people certainly are.

The National winner goes on to Lions International next year in Melbourne, for the final level of judging. Diane thanked the Lions Club for their continuing support of this wonderful project.

Art Judge, Tania gave a brief overview on what she was looking for in the drawings whilst keeping in mind the theme for this year's peace poster which is "Dare to Dream".

Each entrant gave a brief description of their paintings Alexander depicted the four seasons and continued theme of striving for peace. INTERNATIONAL WEEK OF DEAF PEOPLE

The National Week of Deaf People (NWDP) is an event that will run from September 18th to September 24th, focusing on celebrating Deaf individuals, the Australian Deaf community and their achievements. The theme of the event this year is 'A World Where Deaf People Can Sign Anywhere'.

Since the establishment of Australian Lions Hearing Dogs, Lions Clubs across Australia have supported the Deaf Community through the placements of Hearing Assistance Dogs with their deaf or hard of hearing recipients. Today, we want to give back by sharing with you some simple Auslan signs that can help you communicate with the Deaf community!



Find out some more tips on communication with Deaf or hard of hearing people.

- Make sure you have the person's attention and that they can see your face before you begin speaking to them.
- Avoid standing with your back to a bright light or window. Make sure your face is visible and in the light.
- If a person is lip-reading, speak clearly and don't shout. Shouting can make your facial expression change.
- Try to reduce background noise when you are speaking to a Deaf or hard of hearing person.
- Don't cover your face when you are speaking. Keep your mouth visible for the person to see.
- Use visual clues where possible. Point to what you're talking about and use gestures.
- Group conversations can be challenging for a Deaf person. Ask everyone in the group to take their turn and speak one at a time.
- Try to learn basic sign language that you could use in your learning environment.
- Don't give up! Use all the tools that you have to communicate. Write your message down if you're struggling.

GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES

DIABETES HAS AN IMAGE PROBLEM AND HERE IS WHY IT MATTERS

Would you mind being judged for your food choices? Would you mind being shamed for taking necessary medications in public?

Many people with diabetes do mind. They experience 'Diabetes Stigma' every day through comments that judge, blame and shame them for having diabetes, for how they manage it, and for developing complications.

No-one chooses to get diabetes, no matter what type of diabetes they have. No-one should be blamed or shamed for having diabetes.

Professor Jane Speight partnered with Diabetes Australia and published a report **"Heads up on Diabetes and Stigma"**

The research showed, people with diabetes expressed ideas where they think these myths and misunderstandings come from. For example, how diabetes is portrayed in the media. Articles about diabetes typically show images of unhealthy food, such as sugary donuts. Images of headless or faceless people being overweight or obese, or people with amputations or other complications.

Further diabetes campaigns around the world promote the simple message that too much sugar causes diabetes and its complications. Some health professionals focus on what the person could or should have done to prevent their diabetes. They suggest that if they had "just tried harder" or shown more willpower they wouldn't need medications or have complications.

All of this serves to portray diabetes as a terrible condition that terrible people bring on themselves. When diabetes is a complex set of conditions that can impact anyone. **Diabetes does not discriminate.**

What are the consequences of diabetes blame and shame?

When fingers are pointed, they are pointed at real people. First it affects their emotional and mental health, causing feelings of guilt, shame, anxiety and distress. More than 25% of people say attitudes and stereotypes about diabetes have affected their emotional or mental health.

Second, it affects how they manage their diabetes. People who have been shamed for injecting insulin or checking their glucose (with finger prick) often avoid doing so in public. Sometimes they skip or omit necessary injections or monitoring altogether.

Third it affects long-term health. The impact on self-care can cause high or low glucose levels in the immediate term. Over the longer term, higher glucose levels put people at greater risk of developing serious complications.

Finally, stigma and discrimination can have a harmful impact on relationships, work, travel and other opportunities in life. To avoid negative reactions, one in three people with Type 1 diabetes don't tell other people that they have diabetes.

This can lead to **loneliness and isolation** which affects both mental and physical health. People have explained that their close personal relationships have ended, they have lost jobs, and lost opportunities for promotion.

So what can we do to #EndDiabetesStigma?

We know that the media, diabetes organisations, some health professionals and researchers have, in the past, been part of the problem.

Most cases of stigma arise because of thoughtlessness or misunderstanding. It is unrealistic to expect everyone without diabetes to know everything about what it's like to live with diabetes. However, what we can expect from other people is respect, kindness and compassion for those living with a condition that they don't understand.

So we are calling on everyone to **THINK AGAIN.**

GLOBAL CAUSE ... HUNGER SANDWICHES FOR KIDS

I have been asked by several Lions Club Members how the "Sandwiches For Kids" (our name for the program) that two Clubs in Toowoomba are involved with works so I contacted Eat Up Australia for information to pass on to you.

Make, Pack and Deliver!

<u>Eat Up Australia</u> is a not for profit organisation whose mission is to "feed hungry kids so they can grow, learn and succeed."

The Mission of Eat Up Australia and one of the five Lions Global Causes, "Hunger" intertwine, making <u>"Sandwiches for Kids"</u> a Project the two Toowoomba Clubs could embrace with enthusiasm.

The health and education of our children is uppermost in our minds. Every family has its own dynamic and concerns but a constant is nutrition for children to enable them "To learn, grow and succeed."

It is hoped that by providing lunch to vulnerable children, they can be helped make the most of their learning opportunities. Since the inception of the Project in 2017 over 1,800,000 sandwiches have been delivered nationwide. The number of schools supported has grown from twenty in 2017 to over two hundred schools in regional and remote areas around the country today.

Cheese sandwiches are made by groups of volunteers and then delivered locally to schools in need once every three to four weeks during the school term (sometimes along with donated snacks and fruit). Depending on how many volunteers are participating the activity ranges from a couple of hours to half a day. The schools then freeze the sandwiches so they can be toasted or defrosted as required, when a child attends without food from home.

All the ingredients and equipment needed are provided so there is no cost to the participants. Eat Up Australia also manages the administration and communication with the schools around any adjustments to sandwich requirements, so participating groups simply make the sandwiches and deliver them to the local schools.

Help is needed to reach kids in regional towns around Australia as there are schools waiting to receive support. Eat Up works with a range of clubs, community groups and schools in regional areas, and coordinates behind the scenes so the participant involvement is straightforward, cost free and impactful.

GLOBAL CAUSE ... VISION ... WORLD SIGHT DAY



WORLD SIGHT DAY -- THURSDAY, 12 OCTOBER, 2023

Word Sight Day focuses global attention on blindness and vision impairment and is an opportunity to remind ourselves of the importance of good vision to a healthly life. It was established in 2000 by the World Heath Organisation (WHO) and International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB).

Sight is considered our most important sense, so it is the sense that we fear losing the most. Yet do we know enough about our eyes and how to take care of them? I would ask all of you to be aware of the following conditions which we should be checking overselves for every 2 years.

- GLAUCOMA: One in 10 people will develop Glaucoma which affetes visual function through damage to the optic nerve. There is a higher risk in people with a near blood relative who has Glaucoma and increases after the age of forty years. Damage normally progresses slowly and vision is lost gradually. The early stages often go unnoticed, with individuals not aware until a significant amount of damage has occurred. If the vision is lost, it cannot be restored. It can be treated with eye drops or laser surgery.
- Cataracts: Typically develop over the age of 65 years and is treatable by effective day surgery. However, loss of eyesight with cataracts is very gradual and needs regular eye checks.
- Diabetic Retinopathy: Caused by the increasing health problem with Diabetes. If undetected, it can lead to blindness, People with Diabetes should have their eyes checked regularly so that any changes at the back of the eye can be dealt with at an early stage.
- Macular Degeneration: This causes poor vision by affecting the area responsible for central vision, the macula. It does not usually affect peripheral or side vision. However, reading, watching television, driving, recognising faces and colour discrimination become difficult. It most commonly occurs in a "dry" form, in which vision deteriorates slowly. There is also a "wet" form which progresses quickly and needs immediate attention. Smoking significantly increases the risk of developing Macular Degeneration. It is most prevalent after the age of fifty years and affects about 30% of the population.

90% of all blindness and vision impairment is preventable and treatable if detected early. Regular eye examinations with an optometrist can save sight. In many cases, once vision is lost it cannot be restored. LOVE YOUR EYES.

GLOBAL CAUSE ... CHILDHOOD CANCER

The final numbers are in for the last Lions year. As at 30 June 2023 a total of **\$49,056** has been raised by the District from thirty-five Clubs (up from twenty-six last year), two x Lioness Clubs, one Leo Club and one other donation. We provided \$500 for Awards, \$8,897 from Biggest BBQ; \$1,011 from the Coin Line; \$32,060 in donations; \$6,000 from the Brisbane Bunya High Tea event and \$588 from the sale of merchandise. The total in 2021-22 was \$25,810. Well done by all involved.

However, one area where we could improve is by making more use of the Awards option. In 2021-22 the District and two Clubs used \$2,643 just for awards. With only one Club using \$500 for awards this year this is an area worth investigation.

The figures I am given do not show if any of your donations have been used for awards. I will follow that up before my next report. This <u>link</u> takes you to information on the awards. More info on these awards will be available at the Convention.



Fund raising via the <u>Julikemychops</u> initiative is continuing. As you can see I have enlisted my Irish friend Murphy to help. (Thanks District Governor Andy for giving him his name). Do you think our state should consider erecting more water catchment areas to meet the demand of water requirements with the increase of population growth exceeding the amount of water already available?
