SEARCHING FOR THE HOLY GRAIL: STOPPING THE SPREAD OF PROSTATE CANCER

One of Australia's most promising prostate cancer researchers believes she's on the cusp of what could be a holy grail discovery in stopping metastatic prostate cancer switching off the body's natural immune response as tumours spread to the bone.

The pioneering research, supported by Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA), could help identify men most at risk of their cancer spreading and make existing therapies more effective.

"We've identified an immune signalling pathway, which is suppressed when cancer cells move from the prostate to bone, making the tumour cells invisible, allowing them to evade the body's natural immune system and enabling the tumour to grow undetected and making them resistant to therapy," says Doctor Katie Owen, who has received two PCFA research grants for her work at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre.

"We've found that in certain circumstances we can switch off these cancer cells and stop them expressing proteins which shuts down the good immune responses, creating a pro-tumour environment.

"This discovery is really exciting because if we can make these cells which are invisible seen, then we can explore ways to block it.

"It could make existing therapies more effective, even using them in a different way."

PCFA Chief of Mission and Head of Research, Professor Jeff Dunn AO, says the findings could transform the treatment of advanced prostate cancer.

"The spread of prostate cancer cells to bone is hard to predict, hard to treat, and hard to beat. This research could help identify men who are most at risk and allow us to deliver targeted therapies to slow down or stop the disease and improve overall survival."

Prostate cancer metastasis occurs when cells proliferate and spread beyond the prostate to other parts of the body, often to the bone.

"Prostate cancer is different to other cancers. It's unique in the way it metastasises because it almost always goes to the bone, which makes it even more challenging to treat effectively," Dr Owen says.

"With many of the most deadly forms of prostate cancer, the cancer cells trigger a protein which makes them invisible to the immune system, turning off the immune response that would ordinarily stop the cancer growth. This is where it gets tricky for the body, because the body can't fight what it can't see." One of Australia's most promising prostate cancer researchers believes she's on the cusp of what could be a holy grail discovery in stopping metastatic prostate cancer switching off the body's natural immune response as tumours spread to the bone.

The pre-clinical trials examined and profiled tissue samples of men with metastatic disease, with the scientists looking at not only changes in the primary tumour but also in the metastatic sites themselves. "Identifying these biomarkers through something like an initial blood test, which is fast and cost-effective could help identify men most at risk, giving them

the best chance at survival and also greatly improving their quality of life," she says.



PCFA has recently established Australia's first Prostate Cancer Future Fund with the goal of accelerating world-leading research to save the lives of more men.

"Australia has one of the highest rates of prostate cancer in the world. It is a disease that accounts for more hospitalisations than any other type of cancer and claims the lives of more than 3,500 Australian men each year," Professor Dunn says.

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australia, with over 24,000 men likely to be diagnosed this year.

"While the rate of men dying from prostate cancer in Australia has been gradually falling over the past 20 years, around 10 Australian men still die every day to the disease, and the number of aggressive prostate cancers diagnosed is increasing dramatically as the population ages."

"Over the past 40 years five-year relative prostate cancer survival rates have increased from around 58% to 95%. That's a remarkable achievement which demonstrates the impact of research into better diagnosis and treatment," he says.

Dr Owen said the research has the potential to make real and achievable change in treatment of the disease, making it less invasive, more effective, affordable to deliver, and easily accessible.

"Research into bone metastasis is often put into the too hard basket and deserves more support. We need to know why treatments are failing and why tumour cells behave differently. "Ultimately, the work being funded by PCFA right now will help to save lives, minimising the harms of prostate cancer and ensuring all Australian men have an opportunity to beat it before it spreads."

Your Management Committee will set the date of the AGM but as Secretary you must notify Club members in writing the date, time, and venue at least fourteen days prior to the meeting.

Your Lions Insurance Certificates of Currency from 1 September 2023 to 1 September 2024 are available for downloading from the Lions Australia Website.

If your club has taken the optional additional insurance, you will have received a renewal notice for that.

The District Governor team continue with their Club visits, thank you for your prompt replies and please continue to send in nominations for your Club members to receive a District Governor Excellence Award or a Distinguished Service Award.

Some news on the New Lion Portal, we can now expect it in January 2024. A quote from the Global Lions Forum "Our Lion testers are in the new portal! They will find issues and report. That is what User Acceptance Testing is all about. We are thankful for their work to ensure a successful launch in January 2024". So, watch this space and I will bring you information as I get it. SERVICE MATTERS




While visiting the Clubs in our Q3 District, Richard and I have repeatedly heard from members that helping others in our communities, makes us proud to be Lions. And so it should!

CAKE & MINT PORTFOLIO October 2023

CAKES -

I have had a number of calls and emails looking for the password for printing out this year's Cake Order Form. I have published this in several newsletters as well as sending it to all of the Clubs.

If, as your Club Cake Chairman this information has not reached you or if you have not copied this information, I will again put it into this month's edition.

For those Clubs that go in through the Lions Australia website you will be faced with the following steps –

- ♣ Get Involved (place cursor over it)
- Move cursor over Fundraising.
- ♣ Click on Mints & Cakes
- ♣ Find Cake Order Form
- You'll see that the UserID is shown. (UserID - cakes)
- You'll need the Password. (westons2020)
- ♣ Then you will need to Download it
- ♣ Might I suggest that you then save it to your computer just in case you need to put in a second or third order.

Remember too, that there is another mandatory field been added, please fill this in as it will make your delivery easier particularly if you are having it delivered to your den, or to a business, if you tick the appropriate box then this will help the courier get it to where you want it delivered.

Some really good news is coming forward from feedback that deliveries have been well and truly under the 10-day turnaround, so please, when you key in your order be prepared for it to come a little earlier than you may have experienced in the past.

If you happen to have any challenges, please do not hesitate to contact me, happy to help. This of course means both Cakes and Mints, to those Clubs still on the Mint Programme do keep an eye on your orders.

MINTS -

Mints continue to be a challenge, so if you experience any issues at all please let me know as we need to keep a record of any order and or delivery problems that you may encounter.

If you have an order in or have just received your order you must make payment straight away. If your Club appears on the next outstanding payments report, I will be in touch.

LIONS HEADER CARDS

The header card will need to be updated with the new minimum donation price.

We have created an easy solution to update the pricing.

Print, cut and glue the attached sheet with the new pricing of 80c for all existing Lions header cards.

DAMAGED OR LOST INTRANSIT

If a product is damaged during transit, contact Dollar Sweets. You will need to provide details of the extent and type of damage and the quantity and type of goods affected. Dollar Sweets will lodge a complaint with the freight company on behalf of the relevant Lions Club.

Photographic evidence of damaged goods may be requested so it is advised to hold onto any damaged goods until you have spoken to Dollar Sweets.

Goods lost in transit will only be replaced once confirmation has been received from the courier that the order is unrecoverable. Once confirmation has been received, replacement goods will be sent on the next available dispatch day.

Dollar Sweets must be notified as soon as possible of any damaged or lost in transit goods. Credits claims may be rejected if too much time has lapsed.



BLACKALL RANGE KNITTING GROUP

Love rugs, trauma teddies, baby beanies, owl puffs, octopuses, cuddle bunnies – these are some of the things being knitted by the Blackall Range Club's Knitting Group for Youth in Search and the Sunshine Coast Health Foundation at Sunshine Coast University Hospital.

The group has 6 regular members and was formed by one of our newer Lions within a couple of weeks of her joining. Helen claims to be a knitting addict and provides assistance and guidance to those who are new knitters or who haven't knitted for decades. Their fortnightly meetings provide a happy social time with coffee and a chat while producing beautiful products as a service to others. Much of the wool has been provided by another new Lion who



advertised widely on Face Book for unwanted odd balls of wool. Small amounts of various colours are ideal for small items such as owl puffs and clothing for trauma teddies.



The group's initial intention was to focus on Love Rugs, but the task of working solely on such large items was rather daunting for those new to knitting. SCUH was contacted regarding baby beanies - the air conditioning is very cold for young babies - and local police and ambulance officers referred the group to the hospital for trauma teddies as well. The Sunshine Coast Health Foundation, which is based at the hospital, was delighted to have keen new knitters and sent along

patterns for the items that are popular with young patients. These smaller items are less daunting for inexperienced knitters and provide a change from large rugs for the more experienced.

The Health Foundation acts as a central collection point and sends donated items around the coast, including to Nambour and Maleny hospitals and to the University Hospital itself.

It is wonderful to see newer members quickly suggesting projects they will lead so soon after joining. Helen, and Ann, who collected over 100 balls of wool for the group, are among our older members as well as being new, and their enthusiasm has been very encouraging to all of us in the Blackall Range Club.

"I KILN I PITIM KILN!" - "MORE THAN CLEAR!"

Clerence has battled diabetes since she was a baby. Unable to afford medical care, she developed cataracts which seriously impaired her vision. She lives in the gorgeous archipelago nation of Vanuatu, home to lush rainforests, soft sand beaches, and surrounded by turquoise water; however, the 23-year-old woman could no longer see its beauty.

In Clerence's area of Vanuatu, healthcare resources are often unavailable or unaffordable. Without a diagnosis for many years—something that is all too often the case in Vanuatu—diabetes took a toll on Clerence's body. She suffered through a series of infections, which led to having her toes amputated. Mobility is now difficult, although a wheelchair helps her get around.

Lions of New Caledonia knew they could improve the situation in Vanuatu with support from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). In collaboration with Fred Hollows Foundation New Zealand, Lions of New Caledonia secured a US\$330,043 LCIF SightFirst grant to expand and enhance cataract screening and surgery services in Port Vila, the capital of Vanuatu and Clerence's hometown.

At an existing eye clinic, the grant made it possible to update old equipment and build a new operating theatre. In addition, Dr. Johnson Kasso is the new, permanent ophthalmologist there at the clinic. Prior to Dr. Kasso, Port Vila did not have an ophthalmologist and operations could only be performed once per year when a team from Fiji visited.

Having a permanent doctor in the area came as an enormous relief to Clerence, who had her cataract removal operation postponed four times due to battling repeated infection. When the new operating theatre opened, Clerence was the first patient to receive an operation. She even sang at the inauguration.



After the surgery, Dr. Kasso checked Clerence's vision and asked if she could see clearly. Clerence had a smile on her face she couldn't hide. She shouted, "I kiln I pitim kiln!" – meaning "more than clear!" in her native language. It was a significant and memorable moment for Clerence, Dr. Kasso, and the clinic's nurses. Clerence says she is "happy tumas" – very happy – to receive the surgery. What was once dark, cloudy, and blurry, became bright, crisp, and clear.


Global Membership Team

GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES

DIABETES, ALCOHOL, AND SOCIAL DRINKING

So we all like a little tipple, if you are a diabetic this can cause some issues.

HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW.

Alcohol can interact with diabetes medications and impact your blood sugar. If you're living with diabetes talk to your Doctor about how alcohol may impact your condition management plan.

ALCOHOL INTERACTS WITH DIABETES MEDICATIONS.

Alcohol can cause blood glucose levels to rise or fall, depending on how much you drink. Some diabetes tablets also lower blood glucose levels by stimulating the pancreas to make more insulin. Combining the blood-sugar-lowering effects of the medication with alcohol can lead to hypoglycaemia or "Insulin shock" which is a medical emergency.

ALCOHOL PREVENTS YOUR LIVER FROM DOING ITS JOB.

When you drink alcohol, your liver has to work to remove it from your blood instead of working to regulate blood sugar, or blood sugar glucose. For this reason, you should never drink alcohol when your blood sugar is already low.

NEVER DRINK ALCOHOL ON AN EMPTY STOMACH.

Food slows down the rate at which alcohol is absorbed into the bloodstream. Be sure to eat a meal or snack containing carbohydrates if you are going to drink alcohol.

<u>ALWAYS TEST BLOOD SUGAR BEFORE HAVING AN</u> ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE.

Alcohol impairs your liver's ability to produce glucose, so be sure to know your blood glucose number before you drink an alcoholic beverage.

ALCOHOL CAN CAUSE HYPOGLYCAEMIA.

Within a few minutes of drinking alcohol, and for up to 12 hours afterward, alcohol can cause your blood glucose levels to drop. After consuming alcohol, always check your blood glucose level to make sure it is in the safe zone. If your number is low eat a snack to bring it up.

YOU CAN SAVE YOUR LIFE BY DRINKING SLOWLY.

Drinking too much alcohol can make you feel dizzy, sleepy, and disorientated—same symptoms as hypoglycaemia. Be sure to wear a medical alert bracelet that alerts the people that you have diabetes.



GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES CONTINUED

KNOW YOUR LIMIT ... IT CAN SAVE YOUR LIFE.

Your healthcare provider will tell you how much alcohol is safe for you to drink. Depending on your health condition, that may mean no alcohol at all. In some cases women with diabetes may have no more than one alcoholic beverage per day. Men no more than two.

If you have high blood pressure or nerve damage from your diabetes, drinking alcohol may worsen these conditions.

You should check with your healthcare professional to determine whether alcoholic beverages are safe for you to drink.

Some distilled spirits are typically mixed with sugar-containing liquids or juices which can raise blood sugars.

A study conducted in 2016 in more than 383,000 people found that alcohol intake was associated with a higher risk of prediabetes. However, mild to moderate consumption of alcohol was actually linked to a lower risk of developing Type 2 diabetes.

Some studies have shown a beneficial effect of red wine on diabetes, although the evidence remains uncertain. If you are planning on having an alcoholic beverage red wine may be a good choice as it has some antioxidant properties and can be lower in carbohydrates. Sweet tasting wines do have more sugar content.

More research is needed to understand the potential relationship between diabetes risk and alcohol consumption.

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By now all Clubs that are organising a Lap the Map event, you should be well on the way to completing arrangements.

Don't forget November is Diabetes awareness month and Diabetes day is of course November 14<sup>th</sup> and if your Club is not running a Lap The Map event then why not get out and about and raise awareness, it can always double up as a membership drive, even a few hours in your local area, or going for a walk with your Club shirts or anything blue, is always a good idea with the spring weather being so lovely.

## **GLOBAL CAUSE ... WHAT IS HUNGER?**

According the UN's Hunger Report, hunger is the term used to define periods when populations are experiencing severe food insecurity – meaning that they go days without eating due to lack of money, lack of access to food or other resources.

#### Definition of Hunger:

Hunger is the distress associated with the lack of food. The threshold for food deprivation is fewer than 1800 calories per day.

#### Food Security:

Relates to the availability and access of food to maintain a healthy and active lifestyle. In 2015 the UN published a report whereby world leaders charted a new set of Sustainable Development Goals. The second one of these is to 'end hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture' by 2030.

#### **Hunger Fast Facts:**

- \* There is more than enough food produced in the world to feed everyone on the planet.
- \* As many as 811 million people go to bed hungry each night.
- \* Small farmers, herders and fishermen produce about 70 % of the global food supply, yet they are especially vulnerable to food insecurity. Poverty and hunger are most acute among rural populations.
- \* Conflict is a cause and consequence of hunger. In 2020, conflict was the primary driver of hunger for 99.1 million people in twenty-three countries.
- \* An estimated 14 million children under the age of five worldwide suffer from severe acute malnutrition, also known as severe wasting, yet only 25% of acutely malnourished children have access to lifesaving treatment.

There is a whole raft of literature on line that is looking at ways of alleviating World Hunger which is well worth a read. It is time for each and every one of us to reflect on how lucky most of us are here in our little patch of the world – particularly here in sunny Queensland.

Unfortunately there is a minority group of people who through no fault of their own are having a tough time providing three meals a day. Hunger can have a detrimental effect on kids in the classroom which is a proven fact. There are a few Clubs taking part in the Eat Up program – making Sandwiches for Kids – by making cheese sandwiches, taken to schools, they freeze them and when a child presents at school without lunch – one of the sandwiches is then toasted for them. Other clubs are involved Breakfast Clubs in schools.

#### Are you prepared?


#### Fire Season:

Have an evacuation plan in place and obey all instructions to leave. *Human Safety is paramount.* Don't think for one minute that it can't happen in the city remember what happened in Canberra several years ago. Now with more and more people moving to country living, chances grow twofold.

Water is never more important than during the Summer months than other months of the year. With the predication of a El Nina event happening this summer season we will have to be extremely careful with our water usage.
