While each Family Fun Day will vary, they have things like jumping castles, climbing walls, face painting and so on for the attendees.


They have a small budget for catering which allows them to purchase food, but what they don't have are sufficient staff to cook the food.





CAKE & MINT PORTFOLIO May 2024

My article this month will consist of several reminders, this information is very important to your Club.

Taking part in the Cake & Mint Programme comes with a few rules and I think it is very important to remind you all what these rules are and why we have put them in place.

- (1) All orders placed between January and June each year MUST be paid for with the order. In other words, these accounts MUST be cleared by the 1st July each year.
- (2) Refer to (1) this account CANNOT be held over once the new Lion's year commences.
- (3) Come the 1st July you MUST use the new order form that will be available from that date. No orders will be filled on old order forms.
- (4) Speaking of payments, Traditional Foods each year give you, our Clubs, until the end of January the following year (e.g. peak period this year is between August '24 to December '24 and all payments MUST be finalised by 31st January 2025).
- (5) Refer to (4) after the debacle this year with a handful of Clubs there will be no extension on finalising your payments. These MUST all be cleared by the end of January 2025.
- (6) Remember that the 1.5kg Cakes will now come in a carton of 8 and not 10. This is happening now, as from the 1st July the order form will reflect the price of a carton of 8, until July using the current order form (which still shows 10 to the carton) Traditional Foods will amend your invoice amount.
- (7) IMPORTANT NOTE the RRP for this year will remain the same, that is 1.5kg Cakes \$20, 1.0kg Cakes \$16, 900gm Puddings \$16 and the new product the 400gm Pudding, price is yet to be determined.

- 8) The smaller size Pudding is a great way to test the waters in your area, particularly if you do not sell Puddings to date.
- (9) As with the small and large cakes, having a small and large pudding means that we should capture all tastes out there is community land. So why not buy a couple of cartons to see what your market will be for the smaller variety.
- (10) Don't forget the 80gm Minis either, these seem to do very well, improving in sales each year. Look for outlets for this product as well. A few ideas to try
 - Coffee Vans (Cake & Coffee deal)
 - Waiting Room at dealership when having your car serviced.
 - Funeral Homes
 - Use your imagination.
- (11) With any Mint orders please remember that these need to be paid for with the order, if you have an outstanding amount for 150 days, any further order will be held until your account has been paid in full
- (12) Please remember that I am here to assist you with any problems, any ordering hiccups and of course any issues with payments etc. Please do not leave it until it is a major problem, call me before it gets to that point, we can sort it out and fix it in a timely manner.
- (13) I am continuing in this role next year and again please remember I am here to help.

LAND BASED INFLATABLE DEVICES

Inflatable amusement devices can be a hazard if they are not set up and operated according to relevant instructions. Poor inflatable set-up or operation can lead to:

- the amusement device becoming airborne during strong wind gusts
- the amusement device collapsing and trapping patrons, and
- injury to patrons on amusement devices where they can move freely without supervision e.g. an inflatable device (continuously blown) like a jumping castle.

Inflatable devices should be:

- secured and anchored with anchor points provided according to the manufacturer's instructions and relevant technical standards
- evacuated when wind gusts exceed the manufacturer's guidelines or when the wind gusts are over 40 km per hour
- installed with suitable impact absorbing mats if they are in areas where patrons can fall off the unfenced platform of the inflatable e.g. entrance and exits
- supervised at all times by people who are competent to operate the device safely
- monitored so a device is not used at the same time by more than the recommended maximum number of patrons
- monitored so electrical or other powered components of the inflatable cannot be interfered with by patrons, in particular children, and
- inspected regularly for wear or rips in the fabric.

Patrons should be monitored so only those of similar size and weight are on the amusement device at the same time. This will reduce the risk of injury to smaller patrons. Somersaults, flips or tackling other patrons should not be permitted.

If the land-borne inflatable device is continuously blown with a platform height of 3 metres or more plant registration is required.

"Drawers of My Mind"

Today I gathered all my courage for a long journey: And opened the drawers of my mind.

I started from the top drawer because the most used things are always at the top. I saw everyday topics there: What to do, study, eat, to brush teeth and many similar things. But these are not the main goals of my discovery. So, I gently closed the first drawer.

It was the second drawer's turn. I said, "let's find it this time". There resided slightly different things. What I keep as memories and symbolic items that left a mark on me. A key that my parents gave me to open the door. However, I never come home alone. Then I realized that it was actually meant to tell me that this is my home and that I am a part of this home. Then I saw the notebook my father gave me on my ninth birthday. On the first page he noted:

"My son, my pride, my dear ... I believe that you will take notes on many pages, like the ones on this notebook, and become a very important scientist. Wish you good luck, I love you. Your father".

As today's twelve years old Yekta Yagiz, I understand that my father gave me a very valuable gift; his trust.

With this understanding, I moved to the third drawer of my mind. This time I opened it with more excitement. And soon realized that it was pitch black. But black doesn't always mean darkness. I looked deeply at the very center of that blackness. I remembered how everyone is constantly telling me that "I can't do it, be careful, it's difficult". Then a glimmer of hope shining in my eyes said "Don't be afraid, Yekta! Dare to dream!"

I dared to see through my heart among the "actually blind" who closed their eyes to hope and imagination. I raised my head up to the sky and dreamed. As they said, I couldn't see colors, but I added a thousand colors to the rainbow in my imagination. White is not always bright, and black is not always scary. These are all misconceptions piled up in the drawers of our minds.

I didn't have a fourth drawer. We can't always find a new drawer to start over. But I can fill the empty black drawer with dreams. That's what I'm doing now. What I have done so far and my self-confidence proved that I am on the right track.

As my father's wish, I am on my way to become a scientist. This might be considered a dream for a visually impaired person. But I have the courage to make it happen.

I am a good swimmer and a good runner today. Only because I dreamed that I would succeed. Now it's time to continue to "dare to dream", without letting anyone stop me. My journey is full of hope. And it is ETERNAL.

AROUND THE WORLD WITH LIONS

THE THIRTY-NINTH IN A SERIES OF ARTICLES SOURCED BY LION LYN PYSDEN HORSE POWER (PART 1)

For Lion Diane Besson, saving an old horse was just the beginning....


It was 2018 and Diane Besson was off to Muskego, Wisconsin, to pick up her eggs from the local CSA (community-sponsored agriculture) group she'd joined. As she pulled up to the farm, she noticed a couple of tiny horses in a nearby pen. The only shelter was a small fabric Quonset. One of the horses looked incredibly malnourished. "I couldn't believe he had survived our last winter living in that hut," she wrote in an article for Wisconsin Lion. She found out the horse's name was Victor, and when she asked the farmer what was wrong with him, he told her, "That's what an old horse looks like." She wasn't convinced.

She began to research horse care after watching his decline over several weeks. "It was apparent to me, but not his owners, that he was malnourished and would not survive another Wisconsin winter," she says. Other people must have been commenting too, because the owners had put a sign in front of his pen, saying, "This is what an old horse looks like."

Besson decided she would save him..... The Rescue

Besson had never owned a horse before, so she went to her friend, Lion Robin Salerno, for help. She let Besson groom her horses so she could begin to understand horse care. Besson also needed to find a place to keep Victor. Salerno suggested they drive down the road to Jericho Creek Farm to meet Wendy Konichek. Besson instantly felt at home at Jericho Creek. "It had a calm, quiet energy to it, and I instantly liked Wendy," she says. Besson showed Konichek the photo of Victor. "You get him here and I'll make room for him," said Konichek.

Besson hadn't exactly made friends with Victor's current owner, so she sought help from her husband, Lion Dan Besson. "I needed his political expertise and negotiation skills to convince the farmer to give us Victor," she says. Dan went to talk to the farmer. He brought brochures for Jericho Creek Farm, and Besson credits that with convincing the farmer to let them take the horse. "I truly believe that seeing the brochures and the wonderful place Victor would be going helped convince the farmer and his wife to give me Victor. Granted, they weren't happy, but I think they knew I was an answer to their problem. They either couldn't afford to take care of Victor or were too ignorant of his needs. I think both."



Long in the Tooth

On July 25, 2018, Victor arrived at Jericho Creek Farm. All thirty horses whinnied a greeting to the tiny horse when the trailer pulled in. Diane began coming to the farm three to four days a week to help with barn chores and see Victor, who she learned was actually a Welsh pony. It turns out, he had a dental condition that is common in older horses. The term "long in the tooth" comes from the propensity of older horses to grow long, irregularly shaped teeth. Those teeth then make it impossible to chew properly, and the horse can't digest enough nutrients. So, they become malnourished. Victor was severely malnourished before Diane Besson stepped in.

Once his long tooth was addressed, Victor was able to start putting weight back on. And Besson, spending more and more time at the farm, began to see exactly what it was Konichek was up to at Jericho Creek. to be continued

GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES LIONS CAMP COCKATOO 2024

Lions Camp Cockatoo a project supported by District 201Q3, this year was held between April 6 and April 11 at the Sunshine Coast Recreation Centre Currimundi.

This year was the second full camp to be held after the initial pilot camp in 2022. I must report that it was the most successful Camp to date.

It was attended by twenty youths aged between 15 and 17 years of age, who had all been diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes. Some with relatively new diagnosis and others who had been diagnosed many years ago as young children.

The support team comprised of five Credentialled Diabetes Educators (CDE's), one Dietician /CDE and four Lions. Also one endocrinologist Dr Sofia Velosa who is a specialist in diabetes attended for one day's education. We also have two mentors who both have Type 1 diabetes, along with three of our CDE's.

The purpose of Cockatoo is to assist by way of Diabetes education and management skills for the youths to control and manage their T1 Diabetes.

Many arrive at camp with no diabetes management skills whatsoever all is managed by one or both parents but leave camp completely confident and able to manage their own Type 1 Diabetes. Such is the success of the expert tuition received at Camp Cockatoo.

It must also be remembered that for the first time they are in a group who each and every one have T1 Diabetes. They can relate to each other, learn from each other's ups and downs, they understand exactly what each other is going through and help each other accept that T1 is with them forever, not six weeks not two months but for the rest of their lives.

These youths have never had a sleepover at a mate's house, because of checks that need to be done during the night. They don't go on many school trips for the same reason.

Of course, also at the camp there are many activities, this year there was archery, caving, body boarding, pool party, beach games, Paint and Create, and of course the favourite trip to Australia Zoo.





GLOBAL CAUSE ... DIABETES CONTINUED

Each day there were a minimum of two education lessons on how to manage T1, there was mental health input, how to carb count, diabetes burnout how to recognise it, how to safely have a pump break, and many one-on-one sessions with the CDE's.

Feedback from the youths revealed that Archery, Caving and Beach time were the favourites.

Mentors Jenna and Bailey were always on hand to provide guidance and personal experience on living a happy and successful life and still manage their T1 diabetes.

Bailey being a professional boxer was always a favourite and there were many chat sessions in relation to sport and having Type 1 diabetes, how to maintain levels while playing competitive sport.

By the end of camp, it was clear to see that each and every youth had grown in stature, were 100% more confident in managing their diabetes.

And of course, because this is a District 201Q3 Lions project there was an input by our current District Governor in relation to what Lions are all about, what we do, how we assist in disaster events, and our other projects, international and District.

And at the end of the chat there were questions in relation to Lions work and an interest in how to volunteer with a Lions Club.

It was encouraging to see the interest in Lions from these young people, something we do need to keep going in order that Lions can continue to build on for the future.

On departure day there were tears, lifelong friendships had been made new skills learnt and of course confidence in managing their Type 1 had been gained which is a platform for them to build on in the future.

I have to mention one lad who arrived on day one, very shy and reserved, stood back from the crowd with head bowed. Of course, this was picked up by support staff and all the young folk immediately.

It was heartwarming to see others in the group immediately taking him under their wing. All through the week we all happily watched his confidence grow, along with his ability to mix with other more outgoing young people. He was included in everything and was made a fuss of by the other lads in the group. When it was time to leave this same shy introverted young man, was walking tall with his head up high and smiling and feeling much more confident about life.

This is why we do Lions Camp Cockatoo.

A pantry can be made entirely from storage pallets – dismantling them will be the most time-consuming task.

As we begin to wind- down our Lions year. What have we learnt from my environment reports of **Water Conservation and Protection of our Water ways?**

Water is the essence of survival, no matter what it is.

- 1. Life without water, every living thing would die (be it human, vegetable and so on).
- 2. Industry would grind to a halt (No manufacturing of goods, no jobs, no mining, no heating and so on).

So where does it leave us?????. If we do not protect what we have and use it wisely, we will be a barren planet with no chance of survival - forever.

Currently the TV is displaying ads, saying the Murray Darling River System is being overused, in fear of dying. Although the river system rises here in Queensland, more than three quarters of it flows through New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia.

Queensland supplies about ten per cent of the water flow for the Darling River via the Condamine and Balone Rivers. We must remember that the Murray Darling is broken down into three main river systems that are revitalised by smaller rivers along the Darling River, which is 2740 km long, Murrumbidgee 1690 km, Murray 2530 km. before reaching the Southern Ocean in South Australia.

The Condamine has strict regulations on when water can be drawn from the river for the local farmers on the Darling Downs.

Western Queensland's Channel Country is a land that is watered by water flowing through multiple creeks, spreading across the landscape to form an inland sea. This water then seeps through the ground to help replenish the under-ground water of the Great Artesian Basin. The main rivers of the Channel country are the Georgina, Diamantina, and Coopers Creek (currently flowing as a result of the northern cyclones that passed over the area). Depending on the amount of water flow, will depend on how much water reaches Lake Eyre to keep it alive and for the migrating birds that frequent the area.

Summer has ended, autumn has arrived bringing cooler temperatures which should reduce the use of water for each household. With the increase of migration to our area, we should be careful with water usage, as our water storage dams are placed under extra stress to supply water to each new development, with NO plans for extra storage by governments.
